Winter 2016 International Education: GNED Style

Science in a Global Context (GNED3010) & Global Communities and Societies (GNED3030)

The Department of General Education has created a unique international experience. It combines two 6-credit, 3rd Tier courses from two different clusters and includes on-campus academic work with practical experience in an international context. These courses are open to all MRU students and will allow students to complete 12 credits and their Tier 3 GNED requirements in one semester.

The course structure includes 4 weeks of on-campus academic work, followed by 5 weeks of international travel, 1 week off, and then a final 4 weeks of classes at MRU. This allows for academic rigour along with a hands-on international experience.

The Winter 2015 experience will combine GNED 3010 Science in a Global Context with GNED 3030 Global Communities and Societies, and will include travel to Honduras, Central America.

GNED 3010 focuses on biodiversity and environmental sustainability in Honduras. The course includes an overview of the different habitats and ecological pressures while at the same time developing a strong theoretical background to explain biodiversity. Students will investigate conservation strategies and also participate in research that contributes to the ecological understanding of Honduras.

GNED 3030 focuses on cultural groups, social problems and solutions, and global connections. Along with the academic examination of these topics, students will participate in community engagement projects that will help them understand various ways to create social change.


The two courses work in collaboration to examine issues such as bananas, coffee, and farming from both scientific and social perspectives.
